

Study Abroad Opportunities

Go anywhere! Peruse the International and Off-Campus Programs Website to see what options are available. Students can pick from over 100 programs pre-approved by the College to meet almost all academic interests off-campus. If you have an academic need that is not met through any of the existing programs, you can meet with the Coordinator of Off-Campus Study to learn more about petitioning for a non-approved program. Financial aid transfers on all off-campus study programs approved by the College.

Many approved off-campus study programs are suitable for Sociology majors, as most programs offer cultural insight and community engagement. Some which are especially well suited to Sociology students in the past have been the HECUA programs (both domestic semesters in the Twin Cities and international semester programs, all with a social justice lens), The Augsburg program on Social Change in Central America focusing on Exploring Peace, Justice, and Community Engagement, and the SIT programs (which examine a critical global issue and include and independent research project).

The department will generally grant one elective credit toward the sociology major from off-campus study. If you know you will be seeking sociology credit, check in with your advisor before departure, although credit will not be approved until you return to CC. The department generally awards credit to courses which are explicitly sociological in nature and to related social science courses (e.g., "Culture and Development"). Expect to show a course syllabus and a sampling of coursework and to produce a written statement to be assessed by your academic advisor and the head of the department.

Fall 2013: Sociology Students Around the World!



Ann Stimson '15: Copenhagen, Denmark:

"Spending my fall semester in Copenhagen taught me what living in a society of homogeneity and social welfare is really like. The welfare system of Denmark, often known as the Scandiniavian welfare model, ensures a level of equality that I had never been exposed to. The quiet yet deliberate nature of the biking, blonde and beautiful Danes is exhilarating yet comforting to be around and a part of. Walking the streets of Amagerbro, where I lived, was one of my favorite activities as pastry shops and cafes line the long streets of architecturally magnificent buildings. Baby strollers set outside of eateries as blanket swaddled newborns sleep soundly in the crisp air. These are the most common sights to be seen in the few hours of sunlight in the fall and winter months. My public health studies paralleled and complemented my daily observations of the Danish society as I learned about the details of the health care system and social welfare measures taken by the state. A highlight of my semester was taking a Pregnancy & Midwifery class with a Danish midwife who framed birth in a new way, one that is so at odds with the way it is approached in the United States. Overall, I absolutely fell in love with the Danish people, the sights, the active yet quiet city life and the Danish mentality of living. The staple Danish concept is *hygge*, meaning, in essence, the creation of a nice, warm atmosphere and enjoyment of the good things in life with good people around you. I'll let this speak for itself."

Louisa Rich '15: Nyon, Switzerland:

"I went to Switzerland this fall with SIT's study abroad program. I was staying in Nyon, Switzerland and lived with a French speaking host family. I took trains into Geneva every day where my classes were being held for the first two months. The subject of the program was international relations and our class visited several international organizations in and out of Switzerland. The last month I was doing an independent study project on international adoption issues. For the project I spoke with people from UNICEF, the International Service, and Terre Des Hommes, which were all based in Switzerland. Otherwise, I was mostly doing research using published journal articles on the subject. On the weekends I would travel mostly around Switzerland, hiking or visiting towns."

Lorelei Strasburger '15: Granada, Spain:

This past semester I was in Granada, Spain and it was absolutely incredible. Granada is a beautiful and traditional Spanish city which allowed me to really understand and appreciate the Spanish culture. I was fortunate to travel around Europe and meet some fantastic people. I loved everything about being abroad but it is so great to be back at CC for spring semester.
